### Executive Summary

The Emergency Services Division is seeking Council approval for the construction of a single bay garage at the Centre Lionel E. Lalonde Centre to house the 5<sup>th</sup> wheel mobile command unit in the amount of \$340,000 from Emergency Services – Land Ambulance Reserve Fund.

### Background

During the construction at the Centre Lionel E. Lalonde Centre the overall, scope of the project consisted of new garage space for EMS and the Azilda Fire Hall. The new garage space is now fully utilized housing Fire and EMS service vehicles along with one marine unit, there does not exist any surplus garage space capable of housing additional Emergency Service assets. During the Phase 1 construction, outside space was identified that would allow for future EMS garage expansion, as required.

In October 2007, Council approved the purchase of an emergency mobile command unit for the City to be used jointly by Emergency Services, Police Services, and Fire Services. The emergency mobile command unit will be utilized as an essential tool available to all Emergency Services and allied agencies for response to incidents involving community safety and loss or protection of human life. The command unit will serve as the hub for the planning, execution and assessment of field operations at an emergency scene providing an on-scene capacity by incident commanders to effectively manage community emergencies.

These types of command units are large, the size is required to allow the support of a number of incident staff along with considerable Emergency Services telecommunications technology to support incident command functions. The physical height of this unit is approximately thirteen feet, six inches (13' 6") with the antenna array extending slightly higher. The vehicle is currently in production with an expected delivery date of late April – May 2008.

The command unit is a high value Emergency Services asset with significant "secure" telecommunications technology that requires this unit be housed in a secure fashion, protecting it from unauthorized access at all times.

The EMS and Fire Service bays are full, attempting to park the command unit within existing EMS garage space would result in the displacement of ambulance units outside. In addition, the command unit will not fit through the existing twelve foot doors due to the command unit's overall height of over thirteen feet.

**Date:** March 6, 2008

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In order to ensure the unit is properly stored, Emergency Services has identified the need to construct 1,615 square feet of new garage space on the south end of EMS garage to house the new mobile command unit complete with properly sized doors to ensure that the command unit is maintained in a secure area in a state of readiness and protected from unauthorized access as well as the outside environment.

(For ease of reference, attached is a copy of the Mobile Command Unit report, November 14<sup>th</sup>, 2007 Council meeting, indicating that this unit will be housed at the Centre Lionel E. Lalonde Centre with a modification to the existing Emergency Medical Services building or possibly a separately constructed bay as an add onto the building.)

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Emergency Services is seeking Council's authority to enter into a purchase contract for one (1) 5<sup>th</sup> Wheel Command Unit from LDV Inc. of Wisconsin, USA, via Don's RV of Greater Sudbury in the amount of \$422,000.

This unit will replace a motorhome that had been used in this capacity over the years but has exceeded its lifespan and is no longer dependable due to a high frequency of breakdowns. Emergency Services will have the responsibility to house and ensure operational readiness of the unit at the Lionel E. Lalonde Centre.

## BACKGROUND

Emergency Preparedness measures are considered necessary to ensure that our municipality is prepared to respond to, mitigate the impact of and recover from, any natural, technological or man-made emergency through the provision of leadership and support.

The ability for any community to effectively respond and address any incident that would be classified as beyond normal capacity requires the appropriate infrastructure necessary to mitigate the threat caused by the event. The City of Greater Sudbury has committed to being response capable through the development of a state of the art Emergency Operations Centre that allows appropriate management of any major incident from outside of the perimeter.

The desired model for management of any such event requires not only an efficient EOC, but the on-scene capacity to allow incident commanders to effectively manage community emergencies. Call loads have been on the rise in recent years. Within each of the three Greater Sudbury Emergency Response departments call loads were as follows: 35,000 calls for Emergency Medical Services; 4,000 calls for Fire Services, and 55,000 calls for Police Services. Recent emergencies such as the Pioneer Manor Fire, Northern Breweries chemical release, and the St. Joseph's Health Centre fire and evacuation have further demonstrated the need for a Command Unit capable of supporting emergency services on-scene.

Once procured and following the acquisition and installation of generic and user specific equipment locally, the City will be equipped with a fully function Emergency Mobile Command Centre that will be utilized as an essential tool available to all Emergency Services and allied agencies for response to incidents involving the safety, loss or protection of human life. This mobile unit will facilitate on-site emergency response throughout rural and urban centres. The Mobile Command Unit will serve as the hub for the assessment of field staff, movement of personnel, and will provide one-on-one communications assistance to local resources.

**Date:** October 16, 2007

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For the past several years, the replacement of the Mobile Command Unit has been identified as a priority for police, fire and emergency medical services. Following extensive discussions on the potential to share such a unit between these services, it was decided that a joint venture for procurement was warranted to purchase a command unit, intended to facilitate the management of service specific or multi-agency incidents.

To this end, through the Capital Planning process, Emergency Medical Services and Police Services have each contributed funds from their respective capital sources. To date, a total of three hundred and sixty thousand (\$360,000) dollars was allocated to this project and approved by Council. Additionally, an application for funding was made to the Joint Emergency Preparedness Program (JEPP) to assist in defraying apportion of the costs. Recently, the City received notification that \$40,000 had been approved. Police have identified and obtained Police Services Board approval for funding required to purchase this unit.

In early 2006, a committee with representatives from Emergency Medical Services, Police, Fire and Supply and Services was struck. This committee was tasked with identifying specific vehicle needs, developing a Request for Proposal (RFP) or tender document, to assist with the design of the command unit.

By mid 2006, an RFP was released to vendors across North America. The response to the RFP was extremely poor following which the decision was made to decline the submissions as unacceptable. It was decided that an Expression of Interest would be in line to determine what vendors might be interested and qualified. The committee reviewed proponent expressions and ultimately pre-qualified LDV Inc. of Wisconsin, USA, the manufacturer. Don's RV of Greater Sudbury is the local dealer in Sudbury who represents the manufacturer and who would service the unit locally. A last and final offer has been received and accepted. (Schematic drawings attached.)

## **CURRENT SITUATION**

Throughout 2007, the committee has undertaken significant steps to reach a final design for a unit that would meet the needs of all users. A 5<sup>th</sup> Wheel Trailer model was selected by the team with a final price of \$422,000 including taxes having been negotiated. The unit will also require a pull vehicle at an estimated cost of \$60,000. This vehicle will be purchased by Emergency Medical Services, funded from the 2007 Capital Budget. The total project cost will be just under \$482,000.

This unit will be housed at the Centre Lionel E. Lalonde Centre within the Fire Services bay on an interim basis, as a more suitable solution is being investigated with a modification to the existing Emergency Medical Services building or possibly a separately constructed bay as an add on to the building.

The parties are recommending that this project proceed immediately in order to meet the spending obligation under the JEPP funding program.

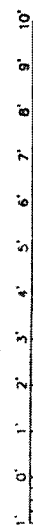

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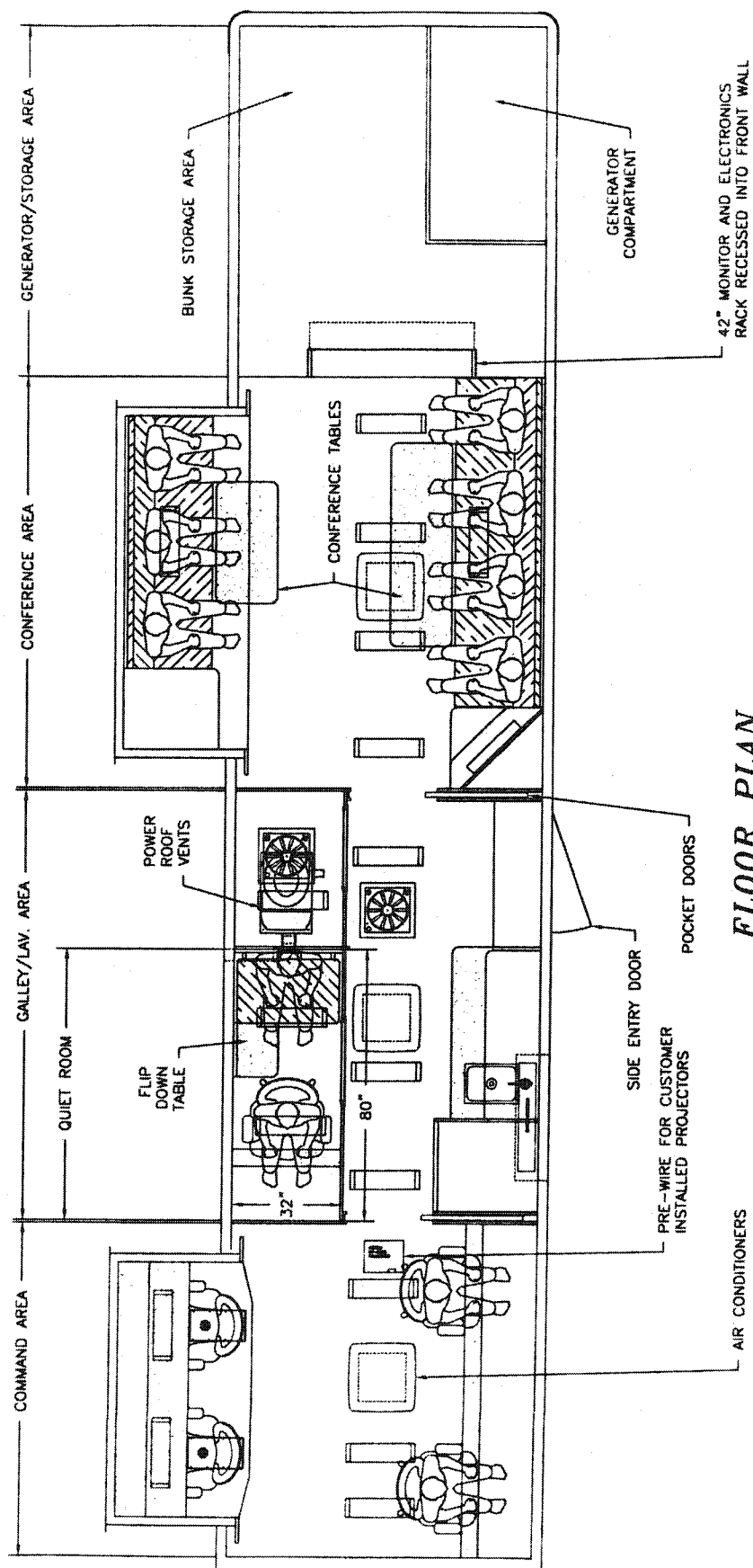

### Background

Established in 1970, the Ontario Youth Games is the largest multi-sport event in Ontario. The 2010 Ontario Summer Games will feature 26 events and will involve over 3,500 athletes, coaches and officials. Athletes competing in the Ontario Youth Games range in age from 13 to 22 years and the event will be supported by up to 1,000 community volunteers.

At the Council meeting of January 16, 2008, Council approved the submission of a letter of intent to the Sport Alliance of Ontario to host the 2010 Ontario Summer Games. Since that time a Bid Committee comprised of community partners and City staff have reviewed bid requirements and criteria and are prepared to submit an official Bid Submission for the April 1, 2008 deadline date.

### Bid Process

With Council's approval, six copies of Greater Sudbury's bid submission will be sent to the Sport Alliance of Ontario office for the April 1, 2008 deadline. Once submissions are received, Sport Alliance will identify a short list of communities for site visits based on the written submission and evaluation. Site visits will take place during the month of June 2008. After the evaluation of the written submission and site visits are complete, a recommendation will be put forward to the SAO Ontario Youth Games Board of Directors. The successful community will be notified and arrangements for a formal announcement will be made in August 2008.

If Greater Sudbury's bid to host the games is successful, the event would take place during the second week of August 2010, likely August 10th through 13th, 2010.

### Benefits of Hosting

- Providing opportunities for Greater Sudbury's talented and motivated volunteers
- Promotion of local sports associations and clubs
- Promotion of local athletic talent
- Economic benefits of hosting 3,500 participants
- Economic benefits of family and visitors coming to Greater Sudbury as part of the Games
- Showcasing Greater Sudbury's post-secondary education facilities
- Reestablishing Greater Sudbury as a destination for major sporting events
- Establishing a community legacy for sport development

### Bid Highlights

#### Showcasing Greater Sudbury Venues

Hosting the 2010 Ontario Summer Games will provide an opportunity to showcase Greater Sudbury's numerous sport facilities and venues. The scheduled renovations to the Laurentian Track facility will be completed in time to host the Athletics portion of the Games. Many water events will take place at the Sudbury Canoe Club and Yacht club on scenic Ramsey Lake. Greater Sudbury's top gymnasiums, fields and trails will also be utilized.

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### ***Building on Greater Sudbury's Talented Volunteer Base***

Greater Sudbury volunteers have demonstrated the ability to organize and support first class special events. Annual events such as the Sudbury Dragon Boat Festival, Northern Lights Festival Boreal and winter carnivals are success stories because of the dedication of our knowledgeable and talented volunteer base. Local volunteers have previously proven themselves to Sports Alliance Ontario with the successes of the 1992 Ontario Games for the Disabled and the 1998 Canadian Special Olympic Summer Games.

Volunteer Sudbury will act as the clearing house and support organization for all 2010 Ontario Summer Games volunteers providing expertise in the areas of volunteer recruitment, training and recognition.

### ***Further Developing Relationships with our Community Partners***

Sportlink Greater Sudbury Sport Council has played an integral role in developing Greater Sudbury's 2010 Ontario Summer Games bid submission and have secured the support of many local sports associations and clubs to assist with the event.

Laurentian University, Cambrian College and Collège Boréal have also been helpful in the bid preparations and will be key partners in the eventual delivery of the Games, providing accommodations and food services to many of the participants.

### ***Connecting Greater Sudbury Communities***

An important element to Greater Sudbury's bid submission is the utilization of facilities throughout our city to deliver the 2010 Ontario Summer Games. Communities such as Azilda, Garson, Naughton and Valley East will have events taking place in their neighbourhoods and volunteers at the local level will be engaged.

### ***Legacy Projects***

In advance of hosting the Ontario Summer Games, a BMX facility will be developed at Adanac Ski Hill. Working with the Ontario Cycling Association, the BMX facility will be built to specifications that will allow Greater Sudbury to host provincial and national events. The BMX facility was identified as a key off season element within the Adanac Master Plan. The Leisure Services Division is also exploring the development of a lawn bowls pad in the community of Copper Cliff. In both instances, the Games will be a catalyst for developing interest in new sports at the local level.

The Games Organizing Committee will also be working with the Sudbury Community Foundation to establish an endowment fund with any remaining proceeds from the games. The fund will be designated to support local sporting associations and future sporting events.

### ***Embracing Greater Sudbury's Natural Environment - Green Games***

In keeping with our Healthy Community Strategy, the Games Organizing Committee will work with EarthCare Sudbury to ensure that all aspects of the 2010 Ontario Summer Games embrace and preserve Greater Sudbury's natural environment. The Games will also be an opportunity to instill healthy community practices in participating athletes to take back with them to their respective communities.
