

Cambridge Model


- Cambridge seeking an economic development solution



Northern Ontario

- The school will be a catalyst for strengthening the N. Ont. Economy
- Economic success will be built upon valueadded industries
- Value-added industries require design talent
- Therefore, economic success requires creative activities and people – "design culture"
- NOSOA is the fastest and most effective way to develop a "design culture" in N. Ont.

- Attract over 400 of the very best students and faculty members to Northern Ontario & Greater Sudbury
- Stimulate the urban environment of N. Ont. small cities & towns
- -The school fits with Federal & Provincial initiatives



Impact

Greater Sudbury is the perfect city

- Contributes to Laurentian University as centre of graduate and professional programs
- Education capital of the North
- Synergies with internationally recognized Green initiatives
- Urban area that is capable of attracting students & faculty
- Largest concentration of architectural professionals

Impact

The Downtown is ideal

- Optimizes relationship between the School and the Community
- Revitalizes the Downtown
 - More people downtown at all times of the day
 - Younger average age
 - Greater ethnic diversity
 - Increased activities for seniors
- Potential focus for a cultural district

- Create a design school for the 21st century
- Foster a new culture of designers ready to create solutions for our communities as architects, as designers, as thinkers, and as collaborators
- Capitalize on Northern Ontario's francophone, multi-lingual, and aboriginal cultures
- Create design solutions for our region, our culture, and our age
- Focus on sustainability with a northern perspective



There is a Market

- -1,600 applicants for 70 spaces at UW
- Existing schools of architecture are not expanding
- Positive support from all 11 existing schools
- Fewer architects graduating than retiring
- Strong job market
- Active support from Northern Ontario architects

Other Benefits

Educational

- Complements existing post-secondary programs
- Adds a new graduate program
- Catalyzes new programs
- Nurtures all educational levels
- Brings education to the downtown
- Partners with Greater Sudbury and communities in Northern Ontario



Other Benefits

Economic

- 420 new students in Northern Ontario
 - \$10 million/year in new money (*direct* spending into the community)
 - \$5 million/year in additional *indirect*spending
- Creation of student housing in the downtown
- Generator of increased business activity



Other Benefits

Cultural

- Talent and creativity attracts culture
- Creative people create successful regions
- Quality of urban and community development improves
- Cultural development is enhanced





Study Process

- Steering committee community, architects, academics, GSDC and Laurentian University
- Phase I Pre-feasibility study completed Nov 07 with financial support from GSDC, FedNor and NOSA
- Phase II Feasibility study underway with financial support from GSDC and anticipated from FedNor and NOHFC
- Phase II Feasibility study to be completed in the spring of 08
