Sudbury Pesticide Reduction Partnership

Purpose and Scope

- To develop a local collaborative support network related to the issue of cosmetic pesticide use in the City of Greater Sudbury.
- To promote a better understanding of the environmental and human health risks associated with the cosmetic use of pesticides in the City of Greater Sudbury.
- To identify, evaluate and prioritize potential strategies for the reduction of cosmetic pesticide use within the City of Greater Sudbury.
- To promote implementation of those strategies deemed to be of priority.

Cosmetic Pesticide Use:

"The use of man-made chemicals to improve or maintain the aesthetic appeal of lawns and gardens"

 Pesticide registration for use in Canada is administered by the Federal government.
Pesticides approved for use in Canada have been through an elaborate approval process.

 The Province regulates the sale, transportation, storage and disposal of pesticides as well as the licensing of commercial applicators.

 Public awareness and education campaigns are necessary whether or not a municipal pesticide by-law is enacted.

Survey by Crop Life Canada and the Urban Pest Management Council of Canada

(as quoted in Basrur 2002)

- 96% of pesticides sold in Canada are for non-urban use.
- 3.2% used by urban professional applicators.
- 0.8% used by homeowners.

 No pesticides detected in City of Greater Sudbury municipal drinking water, either before or after treatment.

GENERAL FINDINGS

 Majority of studies reveal no association between pesticides and health effects.

 Minority of studies reveal weak positive associations between pesticide exposure and some health effects. As a whole, the scientific evidence remains inconclusive on the topic of pesticides and health.

The Precautionary Principle

 "Where an activity raises threats of harm to the environment or human health, precautionary measures should be taken even if some cause and effect relationships are not fully established scientifically"

 That the City adopt a public position in favour of a reduction in the cosmetic use of lawn and garden pesticides on all properties to a level that is as low as is reasonably achievable.

 That the City establish community targets for that reduction and a timeline for their achievement.

 That the City develop and implement a plan to reduce the cosmetic use of lawn and garden pesticides on all municipallyowned properties.

 That the City employ targeted education and/or advocacy to promote reduced cosmetic pesticide use on properties used primarily by susceptible populations (i.e., day-care centres, schools, hospitals, longterm care facilities).

 That a community outreach and education campaign be conducted with the purpose of increasing the proportion of property owners who choose to care for their lawn and gardens using low-risk alternatives to pesticides.

 That the City continue to monitor the experiences and lessons learned in other jurisdictions related to this issue, especially those pertaining to the effectiveness of various pesticide reduction methods.

 That the City continue to monitor Federal and Provincial legislation changes related to the regulation of pesticides.

• That \$30,000 be approved in the 2007 budget and the 2008 budget for implementing the pesticide reduction strategy.
