Report dated 2007-10-01 was received from General Manager of Community Development regarding Specialized Geriatric Services and Future Regional Geriatric Program.

Proposal for North Eastern Ontario Specialized Geriatric Services (Phase 1) and a Future Northern Regional Geriatric Program (Phase 2) was distributed to the Council Members.

Dr. Maurice St. Martin introduced Dr. Jo-Anne Clarke, one of six graduates across Canada interested in dementia and geriatric medicine and only one of two in Ontario, Mr. Andre Roch, currently working Extendicare Falconbridge and Extendicare York, and Dr. Michael Borrie. Dr. Clarke's mentor.

Dr. Clarke made an electronic presentation regarding specialized geriatric services and a future geriatric program. She indicated that one in seven Canadians is 65 years or older. She outlined the implications of this fact on the health care system. She indicated that chronic disease is the main cause of old age disability with people over 70 years usually having two or three chronic conditions accounting for approximately two-thirds of total health care expenditure. She explained geriatric medicine and what is involved in good geriatric care. She stated that there has been a 49% decrease in geriatric medicine residents since 1997. She explained the help available including multidisciplinary teams, home care and local resources such as Northeastern Ontario Dementia Assessment and Consultation, Alzheimer's Society, etc. She stated that there are five Regional Geriatric Programs (RGP) in Ontario and outlined the RGP mandates and primary goals. She explained the two phases: Phase 1 - Specialized Geriatric Services for North Eastern Ontario and Phase 2 - RGP for Northern Ontario. She listed the next steps including reinstating the Seniors' Campus Steering Committee, recruitment of the geriatrician and working with partners in outlying areas.

Dr. Roch thanked all the physicians and nurses involved in geriatric care in the past 20 - 25 years as stated they do not have any coordination. He stated that nurse practioners should be trained in Sudbury for people in Sudbury. He indicated his interest is in care for people over 65 and to put in the past substandard care for older people.

Dr. St. Martin, currently the geriatric lead at the hospital, indicated that Sudbury is in a crisis situation which is causing, among other things, hospitals to cancel surgeries. He stated there is currently a need for more nursing home beds and questions what will happen in the next three years. Keeping some of these people at home, will help the situation. He indicated there is now a window of opportunity to bring back a Sudbury native to help relieve some of the stresses. He asked that Council support Dr. Clarke's efforts to come to Sudbury to provide geriatric care and mentor health care provides.

Dr. Michael Borrie explained how a geriatric program is assembled and the approximate time lines.

Water Main Break in Valley East

The Director of Water/Wastewater Services provided an up-date on the water main break in Valley East as the system is being brought back to full service. He stated that the Valley East booster, which provides the service to the affected area, was restarted early this morning. He expects full service, with drinking water advisories lifted, by late Friday, October 26th, 2007 or Saturday, October 27th, 2007.

Rules of Procedure

Council, by a two-thirds majority, agreed to dispense with the Rules of Procedure and deal with another matter, not on the Agenda, at this time.

Cambrian Fitness Centre

Councillor Cimino advised that 120 people attended a CAN meeting due to the sale of Cambrian Fitness Centre. He stated there were a number of people in the audience and one wished to address Council in that regard. With the consensus of Council, Ron MacDonald was allowed to speak.

Ron MacDonald indicated he was present on behalf of himself as a tax payer and a member of Cambrian Fitness Centre. He stated it was encouraging to see that Council is interested in dialogue and listening to the people. He further stated that Council's leadership. commitment and resolve is required to do what is in the best interest of the community. He indicated that obesity, the high incidents of heart problems in Northern Ontario and the aging population have placed a strain on the health care facilities. Therefore, services should be maintained and improved to reach the objective of a healthier community. He stated that Cambrian Fitness Centre has an olympic sized pool, the largest walking track in the City, saunas, a large weight and training room offering cardiovascular and aerobic programs. It is also a place to socialize. Some employers send their staff there because it is beneficial to company to have healthy employees. He stated they want Council to become involved because there are jobs involved and it is a valuable service for our community. He feels there is excellent revenue generated and can be profitable or require a small subsidization and perhaps a partnership could be explored and the matter reviewed with respect to other facilities in the area. He stated that the closing date is December 31st, 2007 and urged Council, on behalf of community, to explore any opportunity to maintain this excellent facility.

Item R-6 For-Profit, Big Business Child Care The following resolution was presented by Councillor Gasparini:

2007-484 Gasparini-Caldarelli: WHEREAS Greater Sudbury has a history of providing quality child care programming to the children and families of our communities:

AND WHEREAS research indicates that non-profit programs where parents are involved in decision making offer the best quality child care services;

AND WHEREAS child care services operated by large, multinational corporations are making inroads into communities in Southern Ontario and have started approaching Greater Sudbury child care operations;

AND WHEREAS the City of Greater Sudbury purchases child care services on behalf of subsidized clients and provides wage subsidies to licensed child care operators;

AND WHEREAS the Children's First Roundtable (Advisory Panel) have reviewed this issue and have concerns with respect to forprofit, big business child care;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Children Services Section explore the issues and concerns raised by the Children's First Roundtable (Advisory Panel) and bring forward a report to the Priorities Committee that outlines the issues and makes recommendations.

QUESTION PERIOD

Raymond Plourde Arena

Councillor Dupuis stated that, on Friday nights, there is midget hockey at the Raymond Plourde arena. On the west side of the area there are young people, disturbing and threatening those in attending arena functions and neighbours. He asked if Police Services can become involved with more patrolling of the area.

The Deputy Chief of Police advised that they are presently putting together a project plan to deal with this matter.

Claims Due to Road Work

Councillor Dupuis stated that there was a lot of road work being done this summer by contractors. In one area, two residents damaged their vehicles; which damage was clearly not the motorists' fault. He was told that the City can not do anything about it and the residents have to deal with the contractors. He asked if a clause can be included in contracts so that the City can be advised of any claims and investigate the same.

The Acting General Manager of Infrastructure Services stated that there is language in our contracts that allows us to advise contractors if we are not satisfied that the claims are being handled properly and take it over, investigate and have it adjusted. In the future, we intend to modify the language of the contracts to have claims handled by staff for consistency.

Workplace Wellness **Awards**

Councillor Dupuis indicated he spoke, on behalf of the Mayor, at the Canada's Healthy Workplace Wellness Champions Award Program Celebration Luncheon. Seventeen companies from Manitoulin and Sudbury Districts received awards for innovative ways to promote wellness in the workplace. He advised that Pioneer Manor and the City of Greater Sudbury received a gold award. He requested that the Mayor's Office send letters to the employees of Pioneer Manor and the City of Greater Sudbury as it should be noted that these awards have been received.

Walkway to Lauzon Avenue

Councillor Landry-Altmann advised she has been receiving telephone calls from residents of Cedar Park who are concerned that there is no railing along the walkway to Lauzon Avenue and asked that a railing be installed.

She was advised that someone would speak with her in this regard after the meeting.
