Information packages from Workplace Safety & Insurance Board and Municipal Health and Safety Association were distributed at the meeting.

The Honourable Steven W. Mahoney, Privy Council, Chair of Workplace Safety & Insurance Board (WSIB) made a presentation regarding Community Workplace Health and Safety Charter - Road to Zero. He introduced members of the audience who were involved with this Charter. He indicated the goal is to eliminate workplace fatalities and injuries. He congratulated Greater Sudbury for their work in attempting to reduce workplace incidents. He provided statistics such as WSIB has an budget of \$4 B and pays claims to

injured workers and survivors of \$3.4 B every year and they receive 1,400 claims a year. He asked the Mayor and Council's commitment to this Charter.

Mr. Mahoney and Mayor Rodriquez signed the Charter which was then presented to Mayor Rodriquez.

GSDC Quarterly
Update

Report dated 2007-11-15 was received from the General Manager of Growth & Development regarding Greater Sudbury Development Corporation Quarterly Update.

Guy Labine, Chair of Greater Sudbury Development Corporation, made an electronic presentation regarding the quarterly update of Greater Sudbury Development Corporation. He introduced members of the Board in attendance. He outlined the progress of their Strategic Plan including the investment in the mining interest and tourism. He also explained that by building a city for the 'creative, curious and adventuresome' attracted film and television

productions, film studios and recording studios. He indicated that Greater Sudbury is one of Ontario's top four destinations, a leader in health research and innovation and a model for eco-industry. He explained the success of past investments including Mirarco, Cinefest and Greater Sudbury Airport. He provided 2007 investments and the amount generated and the projected economic impact. He outlined the funding guidelines and the code of conduct for Board members. He advised of the increased business registration activity explaining it is one of the busiest in Ontario. He provided some statistical information regarding the population growth, migration, real estate sales and vacancy rates. He advised that Greater Sudbury was ranked thirteenth in the top 40 places to do business in Canada by Canadian Business Magazine. He requested that Council consider increasing their level of funding to \$1 M to allow them to continue to be catalysts for economic development in Greater Sudbury.

Report dated 2007-11-21 was received from the General Manager of Community Development regarding Redevelopment of Pioneer Manor.

Randy Hotta, Director of Pioneer Manor, made an electronic presentation regarding the redevelopment of Pioneer Manor. He explained a fire at Pioneer Manor on October 26, 2006 destroyed or damaged all 54 beds in B wing. The residents were transferred to the Laurentian Hospital Site and they must return to Pioneer Manor by November of 2009. He explained the redevelopment will be an

opportunity to incorporate a dementia design and construct a 'green' building. He indicated the cost of the redevelopment will be funded from the insurance settlement, Pioneer Manor reserves and/or existing capital envelopes.

Louis Bélanger, Yallowega Bélanger Architecture, made an electronic presentation regarding the Pioneer Manor B Wing redevelopment. He presented the proposed design with special units for patients with heavy dementia. He also provided the project schedule and the estimate of the costs. He outlined the 'green' opportunities such as green roof, plumbing system that reduces utilization of water and recycling program.

The following resolution was presented:

2007-517 Cimino-Barbeau: WHEREAS on October 26, 2006, a fire destroyed and damaged 54 long term care beds in B Wing of Pioneer Manor;

AND WHEREAS residents who are now currently residing at the Laurentian Hospital site as a result of the fire, need to return to Pioneer Manor no later that November 2009:

AND WHEREAS the reconstruction and redevelopment of lost beds enables an opportunity to advance the Regional Geriatric Centre and Specialty Services and Research for dementia by incorporating a unique environmental design specific for residents with dementia;

AND WHEREAS the reconstruction and redevelopment of lost beds enables an opportunity to incorporate a Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design (LEED);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT staff proceed with plans to construct a 31 bed LEED Silver certified building with a design to meet the needs of residents with dementia and that an additional 25 beds in K Wing be recommissioned.

Item R-2 FONOM - Financial Support Task Forces to Deal with Priorities The following Motion was presented by Councillor Berthiaume:

2007-530 Berthiaume-Rivest: WHEREAS the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities (FONOM) has represented the 110 municipalities in Northeastern Ontario for the past 48 years;

AND WHEREAS FONOM held a Leadership Summit in Timmins in October, 2007 where it was overwhelmingly supported by more than 200 participants as the unified voice of Northeastern Ontario;

AND WHEREAS as a result of that Summit, FONOM has created the following seven task forces to deal with priorities from the Summit – Natural Resources, Energy, Business, Transportation, Education, Health and Government Services;

AND WHEREAS FONOM has suggested a fee of \$0.05 per capita from its member municipalities to help fund this ambitious research and lobbying effort;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Greater Sudbury supports FONOM as the unified voice of Northeastern Ontario and its creation of these task forces to focus on these priorities and hereby commits one time financial support to FONOM in the amount of \$0.05 per resident of our municipality for a total of \$7,900 to be funded as an unbudgeted expenditure:

AND FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Federation of Northern Ontario Municipalities.

OTHER

Canada's Municipal Infrastructure

Mayor Rodriguez requested that Councillor Caldarelli provide a report on the Federation of Canadian Municipalities.

A report titled "Danger Ahead: the Coming Collapse of Canada's Municipal Infrastructure" by Dr. Saaeed Mirza was distributed to Committee Members.

Councillor Caldarelli advised that, on November 21 to 24, 2007, she attended FCM meetings in Ottawa. She indicated that, at the November meeting, Board members lobby parliamentarians. She stated that FCM had commissioned a report on the condition of infrastructure across the country. The results indicated that the infrastructure deficit had risen to \$123 B and is growing at an alarming rate as municipalities can not afford to costs of repairs to their roads and bridges. She indicated that they reminded Parliament members that, of every dollar collected in tax of any form, municipalities received only 8¢ although they have the burden of the greater part of infrastructure costs. She stated they met with 125 members of Parliament and the Senate. She feels they did make some progress and that the Federal members are being to understand that municipalities are serious about this matter and will continue to lobby.

QUESTION PERIOD

Councillor Gasparini advised that a letter was received from Rob McQuire of the Municipality of Assaginac requesting expressions of support for the restoration of a steam ship, the SS Norisle, as a regional attraction. She asked what is the proceedure when such letters are received.

The City Clerk advised that these letters are included in the Councillor's weekend mail-outs. If Council wishes to indicate their support, a motion can be presented.

She suggested that City Council pass a motion.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS

Establishment of a Municipal Heritage Advisory Panel The following Notice of Motion was presented by Councillor Landry-Altmann:

WHEREAS conserving historically and architecturally significant resources is primarily a municipal responsibility;

AND WHEREAS conservation of heritage resources is important as they are an irreplaceable asset and resource which create community pride and identity and benefit both present and future generations;

AND WHEREAS the Official Plan states that Council will consider the establishment of a Municipal Heritage Advisory Panel to assist and advise on heritage matters;

AND WHEREAS establishing a Municipal Heritage Advisory Panel is an investment in the preservation of our community's heritage legacy;

AND WHEREAS the Ontario Heritage Act provides the framework within which municipalities can act to ensure the conservation of properties of historical and or architectural significance;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT a Municipal Heritage Advisory Panel be established and be comprised of 11 (eleven) members:

- two local representatives from the Northern Ontario Society of Architects
- one representative from the Sudbury District Archives Interest Group
- one representative from the development community
- two City Councillors
- five citizens with expertise in local history, culture, geography or anthropology

AND THAT the Municipal Heritage Advisory Panel be supported by staff from Planning Services and Libraries and Heritage (Museum) Resources.
